KWAZI MSHENGU – MAKING EDUCATION FASHIONABLE

"Education is about acquiring knowledge and contributing to the society – we should even "gloat" about it and make education fashionable." These words were said by the MEC during his graduation ceremony in April last year. Mshengu said these words not knowing that exactly a year later, he would be responsible not only for the education department, but for the biggest education department in the country. public policy or pursue a PhD in Law, it's all up to him – it is all so fashionable. Since his appointment (as you will read in this edition of Edu-News), the MEC has hit the ground running. He started his engagement by officially opening the state-of-the-art education centre at Durban Girls High School. Mshengu has addressed the staff at the Pietermaritzburg City Hall, met with teacher unions, conducted a suprise visit at Laduma High School and met with disgruntled Phoenix parents association. It was on a rather sombre note however, that barely two weeks into his portfolio, MEC Mshengu had to visit the family of a learner who tragically died in the car accident at eMpangeni and also visited the injured learners at Ngwelezane Hospital. Such is life, you take the bitter with the sweet.

We wish MEC Kwazi Mshengu all the strength and the wisdom of Solomon as he makes education fashionable. His sharp mind and his youthful exuberance are some of the traits that are certainly going to see him through.

In the words of the erstwhile President of the Republic, "However improbable it may sound to the sceptics," the time for young people to lead is upon us and nothing is going to stand in the way of the idea whose time has come.

Dr Reginah Mhaule has been appointed as the new Deputy Minister for Basic Education. Dr Mhaule, who was appointed as a Member of Parliament during February 2018, has been serving as Deputy Minister for International Relations and Cooperation from 27 February 2018. She served as MEC for Education in Mpumalanga from 2009 until 2018.

During an engagement session with DBE employees a week ago, Minister Motshekga identified the major focus areas for the next administration: "We have stabilised the Basic Education Sector by improving access; however, more still needs to be done. One of the key aspects for the sixth administration relates to issues of quality and efficiency, and providing citizens with a dividend of democracy".

N the 4th of June, The MEC for Education in KwaZulu-Natal, Kwazi Mshengu together with the Head of Department, Dr Enoch Nzama, conducted a surprise visit at Laduma High School. KwaMpumuza, under uMgungundlovu District.

During the meeting with the staff, the principal, Mr Peter Masikane, gave a brief profile of the school and said that in 2017 the school obtained 65% in the NSC results and dropped to 47.14% in 2018. He further mentioned the challenges that are faced by the school, which are late coming of teachers and learners, the problem of not having the SGB, as well as drugs and substance abuse.



The MEC in his remarks, spoke about the filthy state of the school premises and said that one can tell entering the premises that the school has a problem. About late coming of teachers and learners, he requested a list of late comers and told to Circuit Managers to play their role in consequence management. "We can't have 47% this year while our target in the province is 85%. We need a comprehensive plan to turn around the performance of this school", said the MEC. On the issue of drugs and substance abuse, the MEC advised the principal to request police to regularise random searching of learners.

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The HOD also complained about the teaching and learning culture of the school, which he said, "is not strong." He requested a school improvement plan on how they will increase the pass rate in 2019.

MEC VISITS THE FAMILY OF THE DECEASED LEARNER

PON hearing the sad news of the accident that took place on Friday, 07 June 2019, near Empangeni, involving a bakkie transporting learners, the MEC and the HoD woke up early the following day to visit learners who were recovering at Ngwelezana Hospital, as well as the family of a learners who passed away during the tragic accident.





The MEC was accompanied by the Mayor of Umhlathuze, Cllr Mdu Mhlongo, as well as the District Director, Dr David Chonco. The MEC decried the fact that these learners were transported in the bakkie, which is against the law. "Worse still, this bakkie was overloaded, given that it is reported that there were 19 learners in it," said the MEC. The MEC wished all the injured learners a speedy recovery and went to the family house of the deceased learner, where he conveyed his words of condolences on behalf of the department.
