This school has cost the department R128 Million and consists of a renovated administration block, 20 new and modernised classrooms, 2 computer laboratories which include the latest technology, a newly built hostel, a multipurpose hall, a laundry, a kitchen and ablution facilities for boys and girls. Amongst the dignitaries who attended were; the Mayor of uMsinga, Cllr Buyiswa Ngcobo, a representative of UBuKhosi bakwaMabaso, Mhlushwa Mabaso, the Acting Director for Special Schools, Dr Radebe and the Chairperson of the School Governing Body Sibongile Ngubane.

The day started with a morning briefing session where the principal of the school, Mrs Nonhlanhla Dlamini, gave the history and the layout of the school and also gave a short version of how the school was established. This was followed by the unveiling of the plaque by the Head of Department.







During the official opening ceremony, Dr Nzama expressed the department's gratitude. "As a department we are very grateful for the work that is being done here at the school by the teachers, it shows a lot of passion and dedication. We also extend gratitude to the school principal for an amazing contribution that she has given for the success of the school. The department has supplied learners with all the necessary equipment for them to study, all we expect from them is dedication and hard work," said Dr Nzama, who also urged the community to take a good care of the newly built school facilities and avoid vandalism.

The Head of Department closed off the ceremony by quoting directly from the MEC's speech, "Special schools are close to our hearts. As the ruling party and as Government, we have decided to give priority to special schools because they were neglected during the apartheid era. In doing this, we have made sure to provide special schools with free education, learner transport, nutrition, and best quality education possible," said Dr Nzama.

PEACE WALK ON SAFETY IN SCHOOLS AND INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING

HE learners and students from the Department of Basic Education and the Department of Higher Education and Training held a peace walk on February 14 in Durban. The walk started at the Durban Christian Centre and ended at the eThekwini City Hall.

Forming part of the peace walk was the Head of Ministry Dr Ngogi Mahaye, Mr Jomo Sibiya the member of the PEC and Chairperson of Education and Health Committee, Bishop Bongani Mngadi, Bishop Lindelani Msomi, learners of Thornwood High School, Vuyiswa Mtolo High School and the students of Durban University of Technology.

The purpose of the peace walk was to bring forward safety issues that are affecting learners in schools on daily basis to the Department of Education and other departments which were also invited. One of the issues that were raised for the Department of Education was the unprecedented increase in reports of sexual abuse committed by the educators against young vulnerable girls in schools. "We demand that the Department of Education should implement the necessary disciplinary procedures without fear or favour and those principals or department officials who attempt to conceal these cases should also face the full might of law," said a learner.

Dr Nzama addressed learners on behalf of the MEC. "We are going to take these issues to the relevant offices and the MEC will see it today before sunset", said the HoD. He added that, "as the Department of Education and as the Government we are very honoured for being invited here today and we promise that all the issues that were raised will be taken into consideration."

AMAJUBA OPERATION SUKUMA SAKHE



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INTRODUCTION OF THE CONTRACTOR FOR DINGUKWAZI SECONDARY SCHOOL

HE joy was all over the faces of learners, educators and School Governing Body members of Dingukwazi Secondary School as the contractor started to build their school. An amount of R100 million will be used to build this state of the art school in the area of Olubise-Phongolo, under Zululand District. The contractor was introduced by the HOD, Dr Nzama on January 29.

Addressing the packed audience, the HoD said, "The school that we are going to build for you, look after it, and make use of it with care so that whoever will be using it in the coming year, finds it in good condition." The HoD also emphasized that Dingukwazi Secondary School was one of the schools that the MEC prioritised and that it should be completed by May 2021.



SONA PRONOUNCEMENT ON EDUCATION BY PRESIDENT CYRIL RAMAPHOSA - 2019

"In line with our framework for skills for a changing world. We are expanding the training both educators and learners to respond to emerging technologies including the internet of things, robotics and artificial intelligence".

"Several new technology subject and specialisations will be introduced, including technical mathematics and technical sciences, maritime sciences, aviation studies, mining sciences and aquaponics".

"We conducted an audit last year and found that nearly 4000 schools still have inappropriate sanitation facilities. we have launched the SAFE initiative in august last year, through which they mobilised all available resources, including pledges from business, strategic partners and the building industry to replace all unsafe toilets in public schools".

"Over the next six years we will provide every school child in South Africa with digital workbook and textbooks on a tablet device".

"We will start with those schools that have been historically most disadvantaged and are located in the poorest communities, including multigrade, multiphase, farm and rural schools".

"This year we will migrate responsibility for ECD centres from Social Development to Basic Education, proceed with the process toward two years of compulsory ECD of all children before they enter grade 1".

"We will be substantially expanding the availability of these early reading resources across the foundation phase of schooling".

"Since we launched the initiative, 699 schools have been provided with safe and appropriate sanitation facilities and projects in further 1,150 schools are either in planning, design or construction stages".



BUDGET SPEECH 2019: PRONOUNCEMENTS ON EDUCATION

BUDGET BASIC EDUCATION – R250.4 BN EDUCATION ADMINISTRATION – R17.6 BN

"Over R30 billion is allocated to build new schools and maintain schooling infrastructure. An additional R2.8 billion is added to the School infrastructure Backlogs grant to replace pit latrines at over 2 400 schools. But to make certain these schools are effective centers of learning will also require parents to be a visible and constructive part in the governance of schools".

"Our children are our future, most the spending goes to education, and we will strengthen early childhood development".

"Learning and culture receives the largest share of spending as Government continues to access quality basic and higher education, develop skills, provide training and contribute to social cohesion.

"Our budget spending has to focus on getting our country ready for technology. The first step is to fix the education system. Government is rolling out a Maths and Science grant".


THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION IS BUDGETING TO SPEND R7.6 BILLION OVER THE 2019/20 MTEF. THE FOLLOWING ARE SOME OF THE INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS THAT WILL BE UNDERTAKEN:

Dingukwazi Secondary School in the Zululand district will receive major upgrades amounting R90 million.

Pholela Special School in Harry Gwala district which entails the continued construction of a new school with a budget of of R109 million allocated.

Open Gates Special School in uMgungundlovu district which will see major upgrades being done in the amount of R80 million.

Collingwood Primary School in uMlazi district which relates to the contruction of a new school is allocated R80 million.





Umlazi District is among the districts which have improved in the 2018 NSC results. As a district Umlazi has faced some problems and challenges. Mr. Cele mentioned that despite instability in some schools, they aim to increase the results by 5%. Mr Cele said each school is expected to increase with no less than 10%. "Reaching the milestone of 85% with the resources provided will not be difficult." said the District Director.

MENZI HIGH SCHOOL

Menzi High School is one of the well achieving schools in the Umlazi District. It maintains good results by preparing a year ahead, keeping matric students for longer hours to ensure they get sufficient study time and all study materials needed such as textbooks and stationary. Admission is only open for Grade 8 learners so learners can adapt to the school culture quickly. Early grooming is critical, said the School Principal, Ms. Thulisile Ntombela. She also adds that learners are constantly supervised so a relief programme is always in place to ensure that learners are never left unattended to. They operate on an analysis that only considers raw marks without Continuous Assessment (CASS). This helps focus on the true reflection of their performance. This year's focus is mainly on Mathematics in the Grade 8 and 9 to instill a good foundation since there seems to be a gap in the learners skills in this grade that ultimately affects their performance in matric. The school faces challenges such as illnesses attacking mostly matric students and also underlying problems such as pregnancy and drug abuse. The school motto is "The Year ends when it begins".

OThukela District had a very high number of progressed learners (in 2018). Their target is 80% - 85% and to improve on their results they'll conduct quarterly content workshops, weekend camps for learners and strengthning of SBA administration. The district did various things including mentoring of schools, SWOT analysis for progressed learners and motivational talks to learners and educators. The districts' motto is "Siyaphasa for sure." Despite many adversities facing the school did exceptionally well under the leadership of Ms Nondumiso W Nxasana.

Emahlwaneni High School under the leadership of Ms Nondumiso Nxasana did exceptionaly well, in the 2018 NSC results. Ms Nxasana reported not to have any challenges which is reflected by the 100% pass rate, meaning all the learners passed. "Although the district target is 80% - 85% we are looking to achieve 100% again," said Ms Nxasana.



Umzinyathi District was one of the improved districts in the NSC results. "If it was not for the supportive team we wouldn't have made it this far," said Mr Sphiwe Kheswa. He also mentioned the challenges that they face of not having enough resources, but that couldn't prevent them from striving for the best. They conducted workshops at all levels and also applied the SWOT analysis which worked well in their favour. Mr Kheswa said that this year they are positive that they will do even better and they want every learner from Grade R to Grade 12, subject teachers and Subject Advisors to have his/her own target that they are going to account against.

Idlangamadoda was one of the schools that did very well in the 2018 NSC results in the uMzinyathi District. "We tried to complete our syllabus earlier and embarked on intensive revision programme for two weeks which was one of the strategies we used in order to obtain these results," said the school principal Mr Mazibuko, who also said time was not enough to fit with their plan and they could not keep leaners as they like because of the distance learners walk to get home. Mr Mazibuko says the school motto for this year is "shine where you are." Despite the challenges we face as a deep rural school we have to carry our heads above the water, we need to shine and show our existence," he said

"To reach the target percentage (85%), learners and educators should be motivated to be able to work beyond the call of duty and contact time should be prioritised," said Mr Kubheka.

UMGUNGUNDLOVU DISTRICT

"As a district we do have District Academic Improvement and Strategic Action Plans. We have crafted a separate academic programme for progressed learners. They are separately taught during morning, afternoon, Saturdays and holiday classes by their respective subject teachers. Again, we ensured that these classes are monitored," said the District Director, Mr Siqhamo Mabinza. The staffing issues was a major challenge for them in 2018, nevertheless their target this year is between 85% and 90%. Mr Mabinza said they will consolidate multi- disciplinary team visits to all under performing schools being guided by Department of Basic Education (DBE) circular D2 of 2017. Mr Mabinza said their motto this year is 'Working together to take our children to a brighter future, sihamba sonke.'

Mr MJS Dlamini the principal of KwaMncane High School said that they embarked on a number of different engagements with their learners which include extra classes. networking with Gobindlovu High School, motivational talks from different stakeholders and night vigils because they had learners residing at the school. "Teachers took turns in giving evening classes," he said. The principal stated that the challenge of the school is that it is in a violent community and learners bring their fighting within the school premises as a result teaching and learning was disrupted in May 2018 for almost 3 days. "This year we intend to intensify our previous year's engagement with the leaners and set up more cluster schools in the circuit where the learners will be taught by teachers from surrounding schools," said the principal. 
