EXTENDED TOP MANAGEMENT MEETING

N O2 August, The MEC and the HoD hosted the Top Management Meeting at Dokkies. Among the attendies were the DDGs, Chief Directors and Directors, including all the District Directors.

Making his remarks, the HoD spoke about the challenge of the increasing number of progressed learners in the province. This year the department has 34 000 progressed learners, while last year there were 32 000. "Even this year progressed learners are not doing well - the question is do we have a remedy," asked the HoD. He said he is also worried about Grade 9. "Grade 9 seems to be the weakest link from the days of ANA," he said. The HoD also spoke about the unqualified audit outcome that was obtained by the department and thanked everyone who worked towards ensuring that this outcome is achieved.



In his address, the MEC said it is always important to track the performance of the system, not only in matric, but throughout the schooling system. "In the next years, we need to asses all grades regularly so that we get to know well in time what interventions to make. We need to perform better throughout, hence we need to focus on all grades throughout the year," said the MEC.

The MEC expressed his dissatisfaction that it looks like the District Directors don't seem to be fully informed about things that are happening in their districts in as far as school functionality is concerned. "There are schools that get closed more than four days and district director doesn't know," opined the MEC, who asked District Directors to be more in control. He said schools are the foundation of the successful nation and, "we have been given a chance to be part of building that foundation. We can't be part in destroying that foundation."

Making his final remarks, the MEC said that as leadership they are called to clean out corruption in the public service. "We are going to deal with corruption and maladministration in the public service. Where we are called to investigate, we will be thorough and will be decisive, concluded the MEC.



50 DAYS COUNTDOWN TO 2019 NSC EXAMS

Speaking to learners, the MEC said, "We are left with only few days before we start the Matric Examinations, avoid distractions and work hard to make our Province proud." He commended Menzi High School for their sterling academic performance over the years and pledged to support the school. "Our appreciation goes to the principal and teachers for their dedication to duty by hosting extra lessons held after school and on weekends. We expect nothing, but 100% from Menzi High School," said the MEC.

Giving her response on behalf of learners, Amahle Mathe thanked the department for encouraging them to work hard and promised that as learners of Menzi High School they are going to work hard to ensure 100 % pass rate once again and that she will obtain 7 straight A's.



MEC ASKS DIFFICULT QUESTIONS AT THE PROVINCIAL SKILLS CONFERENCE

he MEC, Kwazi Mshengu officially opened the National Skills Indaba on 22 August 2019, at the Coastland Hotel in Durban. The event was hosted by the KZN TVET Colleges under the theme "Skills For Self Reliance."

The main objective of the conference was to create awareness so that different stakeholders understand the role played by TVET Colleges in addressing the need of their local communities. More than 200 delegates from education, skills and development organisations, labour and private institutions, attended the conference.

Speaking during the conference, the MEC said that TVET colleges must take a deep look at their curriculum and ask some of the difficult questions. "They need to ask themselves if it is correct at this point in time when there is high demand for technical skills for TVET Colleges to offer courses like Management Studies and Book Keeping. "I think TVET colleges were designed to offer technical skills and I think our colleges should be at the forefront of producing those skills," said the MEC, forcing TVET Colleges practitioners to think hard about the direction they need to take in critical time in the South African economy.

The conference agreed that there is a need to intensify the resolve to solicit lasting partnerships that will contribute to improving the skills development and ensure impact on the employability and entrepreneurial opportunities for TVET students.



MEC LAUNCHED **E-LEARNING AT EMADUNGENI HIGH** SCHOOL

The injured security guard was rushed to hospital for medical attention. It is alleged that the three refused to open the strong room where the schools valuables are kept, which led to them being beaten to death. The MEC and the HoD visited the school after learning about the incident. On their arrival, the SAPS were still processing the scene. The MEC and HoD comforted family members of the deceased who were already at the scene. The MEC condemned the brutal killing of the security officers and called on the police to immediately arrest the perpetrators.

n 29 August, The MEC went to Glenhaven Secondary School in Verulam, following a learner's protest and boycotting of classes, which resulted into disruption of teaching and learning at the school.

The MEC met with the staff, including the principal and SGB, where it was reported that the riot ensued when the gate system was installed at the school. When the situation got out of hand, police were called to intervene. It's alleged that during the altercation, shots were fired, which resulted into some learners sustaining injuries and three getting arrested.

Learners were also given a chance to give their own version to the MEC.

They complained about the gate system that has been installed while they have no water taps. The issue of not having access to toilets and not receiving sanitary towels was also reported. Learners also complained about racial slurs from other educators.

After hearing both sides of the story, the MEC addressed learners and teachers at the assembly and announced that the gate system will be suspended, while the matter is being investigated. The MEC then told learners to go back to classes. "Let's not be participants in destroying our future by allowing anger to get the better of us. Teaching and learning should resume as soon as possible," said the MEC, warning learners against further disruption of teaching and learning.

WHAT WAS YOUR ROLE IN THIS PROJECT?

My significant role was to facilitate project based on content taught in class and to give guidance on their ideas and research. I have also assisted them to develop powerpoint presentation, to design a portfolio using MS Word, monitored the progress of the project, assisted them with resources required, which included improvisation of columns, condensers, delivery tube and many more. Lastly, I made sure that transport during elimination processes is organised.

ADVISE TO OTHER EDUCATORS:

It is essential to work closely with neighbouring schools and institutions especially if you are lacking resources.

Affiliate with Centre for the Advancement of Science and Mathematics Education to borrow equipments to do experiments.
Assist learners to gain confidence in the subject.

Application of content in real life situations.

Involve stakeholders who are experts in science, such as parents and to make sure that learners see the need and the importance of the subject

WHAT MOTIVATED YOU TO ENTER THE COMPETITION?

Two learners were required to participate in the project, Ms Ndawo(HOD) and Ms Makhaye(Physical Science teacher) gave us a chance as a class to choose learners to represent the school. The class voted for us.

GIVE US THE BACKGROUND OF YOUR PROJECT:

We were asked to identify a problem experienced by our local community and try to find a solution to that challenge. Although we had no idea of what to do, we tried our best to find something which will assist. Our first try was of creating / generating electricity using a magnet. Due to financial problems for the materials we needed, we ended up not suceeding. We then came up with a second idea. This project was about producing ethanol and ethanol vapour from Gavin to be utilised as an alternative energy source during load shedding or to minimise energy usage in households, hospitality industry and in engineering sector. It was a challenging project, but through hard work and dedication, we were able to successfully complete it.

WHAT CHALLENGES DID YOU FACE?

It was challenging to get lab materials e.g thermometer, tripod etc. It was also difficult to create time for preparing ourselves thoroughly and to perfect our model, since we had to prepare for our exams at the same time. Fortunately with the assistance from our teachers and concerned parents, we made it.
