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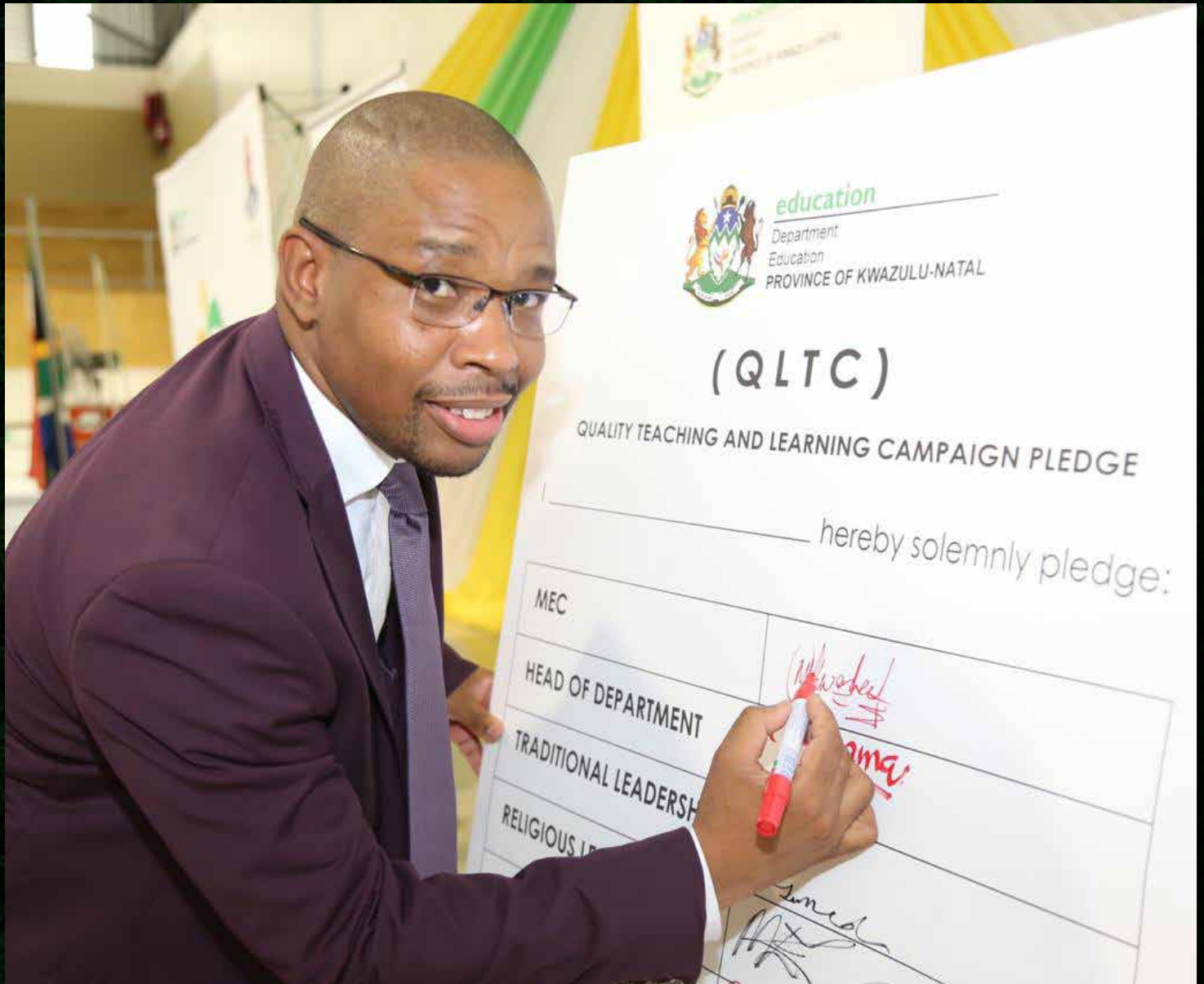

## THE MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF COMMUNICATIONS

### OUR SCHOOLS ENGULFED BY BULLYING

Much as we have started the year on a high and positive note, having obtained 81.3 % in matric pass rate, our system continues to be engulfed by learner to learner violence which occurs in many forms, with bullying being the chief element. Bullying is the use of force, coercion or threat, to abuse, aggressively dominate or intimidate. The behaviour is often repeated and habitual. One essential prerequisite is the perception (by the bully or by others) of an imbalance of physical or social power. This imbalance distinguishes bullying from conflict. Bullying is a subcategory of aggressive behaviour characterized by the following three minimum criteria (1) hostile intent (2) imbalance of power, and (3) repetition over a period of time. Bullying is the activity of repeated, aggressive behaviour intended to hurt another individual, physically, mentally, or emotionally.

Bullying ranges from one-on-one, individual bullying through to group, called mobbing, in which the bully may have one or more "lieutenants" who are willing to assist the primary bully in their bullying activities. Bullying in schools and the workplace is also referred to as "peer abuse". Robert W. Fuller analyzed bullying in the context of rankism.

The Swedish-Norwegian researcher Dan Olweus, says bullying occurs when a person is exposed repeatedly and over time, to negative actions on the part of one or more other persons, and those negative actions occur when a person intentionally inflicts injury or discomfort upon another person, through words or in other ways. Individual bullying is usually characterised by a person behaving in a certain way to gain power over another person. Bullying culture can occur in any context where in which humans interact with each other.

I think this definition will help us understand and be on the alert if any form of bullying were to occur in our schools, or workplace for it is not only our learners that are bullied but also our educators. This will further help us not to look away or to ignore but to take action if any form of bullying is observed. To this end we are not only imploring our educators and learners only but the school community at large to be sensitive and help the helpless.

We urge our parents to take note of any behaviour changes in their children. Mona O' Moore of the Anti-Bullying Centre at Trinity College in Dublin, states that there is a growing body of research which indicates that individuals, whether child or adult, who are persistently subjected to abusive behaviour are at risk of stress related illness which can lead to suicide. Bullying can cause loneliness, depression, anxiety, lead to low self-esteem and increased susceptibility to illness.

Like Mona O' Moore asserts that bullying leads to stress, we have observed this as the department of education that when the bully is suspended or expelled, this normally leads to stress not only the person that is being sanctioned but also those that are related. In cases of learners we have seen parents having to take leave from work to attend disciplinary hearings. There are cases where the learner is expelled, all of a sudden the parent now has to look for the new school, this causes maladjustment that now affect the bully and the parents .

We urge our learners and educators to learn from the vicarious experience of others that have been dealt with in terms of the disciplinary actions, and sanctions are real which have serious effects on someone that bullies other.

People will wonder as to why I have chosen to engage with the subject of bullying. This is informed by the number of cases that we have had to deal with as the KwaZulu Natal Department of Education since the beginning of the 2020 academic year, in some instances learners and educators have lost their lives.

The MEC last year in a bid to curb this scourge, launched the School Safety Programme. This enables schools to establish School Safety Committees. To broaden the base for participation by the broader society in the matters of education, he has further recently launched the Quality Teaching and Learning Campaign (QLTC), which is one of the programmes that is written about extensively in this edition .
